Title: INVOKING THE BEST IN US, 1 CORINTHIANS 13 (Chatham, NJ; 02/07/16, AM) [Pc – Exegetical]

Theme: Love is not only the most excellent way, but it is also the way that exhibits the presence of God in the world.

Purpose: To explain that love is truly the most religious behavior, and to demonstrate what truly love looks like in practice.

Introduction:

- 1. Paul asks the Corinthians to choose not just what is good or better but what is best.
- 2. Philippians 4 exhorts us to focus on that which is excellent: think about these things, and do them.
- 3. By defining behaviors of love Paul exhorts us to choose the excellent, most Christian way of love.

I. Love Is Essential; Even Provocative, 1-3 (Paul silences, even shames, all those who elevate their God-given gifts above other people)

- A. Tongues (1)
 - 1. One of the charismatic gifts, a demonstrable show of the Holy Spirit's presence
 - 2. Tongues are visible and may appeal to showiness: for the bearer, an obvious status symbol of God's blessing
 - 3. Yet without love, tongues are nothing more than loud, meaningless noise
 - 4. They don't even rise to the level of inspirational music
- B. Prophecy and faith (2)
 - 1. Prophecy to understand mysteries and knowledge
 - 2. "Mysteries" has overtones of alleged pagan revelations, and though invested with different meaning in God's scheme of revelation, it would be somewhat prized because of the cultural significance
 - 3. Knowledge among our churches today, we prize knowing the truth which would elevate those with more education (Knowledge puffs up, 8:1)
 - 4. "Faith to move mountains" a characteristic even Jesus said was a worthy goal
 - 5. Even aspiring these things, without love, "I am nothing"
- C. Self-Sacrifice (3)
 - 1. Giving away possessions and martyrdom are lofty goals of discipleship
 - 2. Good works, benevolence, generosity, and self-sacrifice virtually define what it means to behave in a Christian way
 - 3. These are things we are told to aspire to
 - 4. Still . . . "if I have not love, I gain nothing"
 - 5. Yet they are prone to self-righteousness and pride
- II. Love Is: Effective Behavior, 4-7
 - A. Not comprehensive but addressed to the behaviors of the Corinthians
 - 1. Love does not envy, but envy and strife characterize this church, 3:4
 - 2. Love doesn't boast, but they do, 4:7, 5:6 (about immoral things!)
 - 3. Love is not puffed up, but they are 4:6, 18-19; 5:2; 8:1
 - 4. Love is not self-seeking, as Paul sought to model, 10:33
 - 5. Love does not delight in wrongdoing, but they wrong and defraud each other, 6:7-8
 - 6. Other clarifications of love:
 - John 15:13
 - Romans 13:10

- 1 John 3:16-18
- B. Love behaves beyond what it feels
 - 1. Patience and kindness are the first behaviors
 - 2. The things "love does not do" or "is not" assumes also that love behaves appropriately (4b 6)
 - 3. Bears, believes, hopes, and endures all things
- C. The nature of God reflected
 - 1. The ethereal and lofty notion of God's love becomes tangible in the lives of Christians
 - 2. That love "endures" and "never ends" demonstrates that it reflects and participates in the very nature of God who lives and reigns forever and ever
 - 3. Anybody and everybody can do this, even if they don't possess the visible gifts of the Holy Spirit
 - 4. In fact, love is more of a manifestation of God's presence than anything else, John 13:35

III. Love Never Ends: Eternal, 8-13

- A. Love is the greatest for a reason: it triumphs over everything, 13
 - 1. Transitory pleasures tempt us; they satisfy our impulses and immediate needs
 - 2. But love demands that we look beyond immediate gratification
 - 3. Love is patient and it endures all things: love enables us to do better than give in to sinful, immature impulses
 - 4. Even some of the spiritual gifts will end, but love continues on
- B. Put away childish things, 11
 - 1. "When I became a man . . . "
 - 2. An insinuated rebuke: when you grow up, you behave differently
 - 3. See Greitens, *Resilience*, 35 (copy); though he speaks of SEAL training and how it forms warriors (protectors, not blood-thirsty animals), the contrasts fit with the importance of growing up for any of us
 - 4. The practice of love is the process of growing up.

Conclusions:

- 1. Love one another; it is the most excellent way.
- 2. Adopt these definitions and model behaviors.
- 3. God is love: he gave his Son.
- 4. This is reason enough to imitate him.
