Title: THINK LIKE THIS, PHILIPPIANS 1:1 – 11 (Chatham, NJ; 03/20/16, AM) [D – Exegesis, Cause and Effect]

Theme: The effect of Christ's ministry of service and self-sacrifice is to make us live in the same way.

Purpose: To elevate Jesus' model of service as the one we are called to aspire to.

Introduction:

- 1. Doctrines aren't merely tests of faithfulness; they are reasons we live faithfully.
- 2. There is a cause and effect relationship between our living and what we believe, or at least there should be.
- 3. Philippians 2 demonstrates this principle.
- 4. Paul draws a direct line between how Jesus lived and how we too must imitate him.
- 5. He reverses the cause and effect relationship by placing the effect first, and then explaining the cause.

I. The Effect, 1-4

A. Complete my joy, 2

- 1. Paul appeals to his relationship with the Philippians; this is personal, intimate
- 2. He had been in prison there in Acts 16; he is in prison again when he writes
- 3. Encouragement exhortations in Christ to live faithfully; Paul appeals to their consciences to live in a Christ-like way
- 4. Comfort from love consolation: "If my love has provided you with any consolation in your suffering, as indeed it has, then please now respond properly to my request."
- 5. Participation fellowship, a close connection of Christians in their beliefs and experiences with one another: "If you belong to that community brought into existence by the Holy Spirit, and enjoy any fellowship with one another as a result, then live accordingly."
- 6. Affection and sympathy mercy and compassion; again if they've experienced these things in Christ, Paul implores them to live accordingly.

B. Have the same mind

- 1. The word carries more meaning than mere rational thought processes
- 2. Paul means that the mind, will, and affections are brought together in unity
- 3. Hence he can talk about love and unity, not necessarily uniformity in all thought, but one desire for the progress of the Gospel

C. Rivalry and Conceit versus Humility

- 1. The first two things caused divisions in Corinth and were labeled "works of the flesh" in Galatians.
- 2. Humility takes a new approach to others
- 3. It puts us in a lower, rather than higher, position
- 4. That is why Paul can say "count others as more significant that yourselves"
- 5. And look to their interests, not just your own
- 6. Think about how that multiplies the number of people concerned about your interests
- 7. The problem is that no one wants to be the first one to take that step for fear that others won't do the same thing.
- 8. This brings us to the cause part of our lesson.

II. The Cause: Christ's Mind, 5-11 (read verse 5)

A. God, but not equality with God, 6

- 1. He was "in the form of God" not that he only "appeared to be God"
- 2. The Greek "signifies a form which fully and truly expresses the being which underlies it"
- 3. An enigmatic expression for Paul which means that Christ truly was God in his very essence, not merely in what we perceived him to be
- 4. That he could have counted "equality with God" affirms this interpretation
- 5. Yet he doesn't grasp it: he didn't hold on to it as a means of elevating himself above us (even though he could have)

B. He "made himself nothing," 7

- 1. The complete opposite of what his divine nature could demand
- 2. He became poor for our sake, 2 Corinthians 8:9
- 3. He took the form of a servant
- 4. Thus he can say in Mark 10:45 that he came not to be served but to serve
- 5. His service took the form of becoming a ransom for us

C. In human form, 7

- 1. He was fully human as well as fully divine
- 2. His humanity brought him down to us
- 3. God came to us; he sought us out; he became a human so he could become a faithful high priest on our behalf
- 4. That God would so humble himself defies finding appropriate language for it

D. He humbled himself, 8

- 1. Humility is the essence of the mind of Christ
- 2. Paul wants us to imitate this
- 3. It issued in obedience
- 4. It lead him to experience death for our sake

E. What we imitate and why

- 1. Humility
- 2. Service
- 3. Thinking of others first
- 4. Jesus demonstrated it: he is our first cause, the reason we live the way we do.

Conclusions:

- 1. God exalted Jesus.
- 2. Every knee shall bow before him.
- 3. Every tongue will confess him.
- 4. Jesus is Lord (Ephesians 1:20-21) even now.
- 5. Don't wait until you reach the next life when you will do these things involuntarily; confess him now voluntarily so he will accept you into his eternal kingdom.
