Title: FORGIVENESS, FAITH, HUMILITY, LUKE 17:1-10 (Chatham, NJ: 10/2/16, AM) [Pd – Exegesis]

Theme: Jesus' pastoral concerns in this passage begin with temptations and forgiveness and end with faith and humility.

Purpose: To encourage us to develop the characteristics of forgiveness, faith, and humility.

Introduction:

- 1. Pass around a card with several types of seeds taped to it. Ask people to examine them closely, noticing how miniscule they are. (We'll look at them later.)
- 2. In Luke 17 we begin a set of teachings that seem a bit unconnected except that we know them to be important characteristics of Christian behavior.
- 3. The first section addresses our communal and personal relationships.
- 4. The second addresses our faith.
- 5. The third addresses humility.
- 6. None of these are unique teachings of the New Testament, but they are unique because of the obstacles that society puts in their way: sinful man resists them.
- I. Obstacle #1: We aren't as concerned with each other as we are with ourselves; we are encouraged to be autonomous and not worry about what others think.

A. Temptations

- 1. An awful reality: temptations are sure to come, 1
- 2. James lists the process from temptation to death, James 1:14-15
- 3. The choice to give in is entirely ours
- 4. However, we are called to consider the consequences for those who put temptations in the way of others, 2
- 5. By comparison Paul's assertion that those who do such things "deserve to die" in Romans 1:32 sounds mild—they also approve those who do such things
- 6. Jesus thus warns us to demonstrate concern for others
- 7. "Little ones" could be new or young disciples, or even children
- 8. How we behave can affect the lives of others in the community of faith

B. Forgiveness

- 1. Pay attention to yourselves. 3
- 2. An exhortation to look at your hearts?
- 3. Sin, rebuke, repent, and forgive Jesus distills the process to its bare components
- 4. We read later that such "rebuking" must come gently and from a spiritual heart, Galatians 6:1-2
- 5. Personal offences are the most difficult but not insurmountable, and this is about relationship in the community
- 6. Repent is between the open rebuke and forgiveness: there is an expectation that the person will seek to change
- 7. At the same time, even if it happens seven times in a single day, we must forgive
- 8. The inclination is much more toward forgiveness than toward withholding it.
- 9. Forgiveness is the most powerful glue for any relationship
 - He who forgives ends the quarrel.
 - He who cannot forgive others breaks the bridge over which he must pass himself.
 - Forgive and forget. When you bury a mad dog, don't leave his tail above the ground. (Sourcebook, Doan, 105)
- II. Obstacle #2 We might feel that we aren't up to the demands of Christ (more of an internal obstacle of our own making rather than one the world imposes on us).

- "Increase our faith!" is the plea of the disciples
- If this follows from the previous discussion, perhaps forgiveness seemed to hard
- Show the cards with seeds!
- Do any of these represent a great deal of faith?
- Jesus is saying you don't need much to do great things (uprooting a bush was never meant literally; Matthew's version says "mountain")
- Any reasonable person knows that we are not talking about using God to manipulate creation as proof of faith: we are challenged to imagine the possibilities of faith
- Might he be implying that they already have enough faith? Of at least that they don't need nearly as much as they think?

III. Obstacle #3 – A buzzword today is empowerment: something we all should strive for. We live in an age when self-esteem has deteriorated into self-inflation. Power makes us feel important and in control.

- Jesus relates a common household scene: a master who feels no compulsion to thank the servants for doing their job
- Disciples must say, "We are unworthy servants; we have only done what was our duty."
- God is not in our debt because of our service and obedience
- Our relationship with God is not one of reciprocity as it was with the pagan deities: one
 offered sacrifices and gifts to the gods in order to obtain favor
- We are called to stop looking for temporal praise, accolades, applause, or even thanks: immediate honor isn't a right
- The pursuit of human glory is an enemy of discipleship
- Having finished our duties as servants, we must still acknowledge our imperfections
- Humility is the one thing that opens us to further growth

Conclusions:

- 1. The way you behave is an important witness to other Christians as well as to non-Christians.
- 2. If you want to redeem any relationship, be prepared to forgive, Eph. 4:32.
- 3. Most of you in this room have at least a seed's worth of faith; perhaps you just don't exercise it enough.
- 4. God resists the proud but gives grace to the humble. Need I say more?
- 5. In the Gospel God displayed his great love for the world. Won't you accept his offer of forgiveness?
