Title: LIKE THOSE WHO HAVE HOPE, 1 THESSALONIANS 4:13 – 18 (Chatham, NJ; 11/12/17, AM) [Pd – Topical]

Theme: Though there may be some confusing teachings about the timing and nature of Christ's return, we can take hope and courage knowing that it will surely happen.

Purpose: To encourage the church and to remind them that we are those who have hope: death is a door to eternal life with Christ.

Introduction:

- 1. On the day of the Ascension the angels assured the apostles that Jesus would return the same way they saw him leave, Acts 1.
- 2. The Resurrection is connected to his coming in 1 Corinthians 15:20-28
- 3. Both the resurrection and Christ's second coming are pillars of our beliefs and foundations of our hope.
- 4. In 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18 Paul wants above all for the church to be encouraged.
- 5. When he refers to others "who have no hope," he is reminding his audience that they do: Christians are people of hope.
- 6. In light of some confusing teachings about Christ's coming—especially the Left Behind/Rapture school of thinking—I want to make some points about it without being too technical.

Only One Second Coming

- A. Not a rapture followed by 1,000 years and another coming
 - 1. Technically those who espouse a "rapture" suggest that Jesus only takes away the faithful and leaves the rest to endure a "tribulation"
 - 2. These conclusions are complications based on bad exegesis and false assumptions
 - 3. One of the most significant false assumptions is that this school of thought insists that OT prophecies apply to the contemporary middle east
