Title: QUESTIONS FOR THE LAST DAYS, 1 THESSALONIANS 5:1 - 11 (Chatham, NJ; 11/19/17, AM) [Pc – Exegetical: Question and Answer Outline]

Theme: After assuring the church about the Second Coming, Paul reminds them to wait patiently for it with full alertness and readiness.

Purpose: To challenge us with questions to help clarify the issues involved in waiting for the Second Coming.

Introduction:

- 1. Crisis does not make character; it reveals it. (Remember the Foolish and Wise Virgins: five prepared ahead of time, but five didn't.)
- 2. We ask ourselves today: what is our response to the description of the Second Coming.
- 3. Will it be the crisis we aren't ready for?
- 4. Paul assumes his audience knows about times and seasons, but he still exhorts them to stay alert and be ready.
- 5. Let's consider the challenges involved in preparing for the Second Coming by asking some relevant questions.

First: Would we prepare better if we knew the exact date? (1 - 4)

- A. Planning or procrastination
 - 1. How well do people work with deadlines
 - 2. Some get things done right away: they plan
 - 3. Some wait until the last minute though some of them use the pressure to focus
 - 4. Others can't think or work under too much pressure
- B. A different sort of pressure and preparation is involved here
 - 1. Some might be "Mardi Gras" types: let's get all our debauchery in before Lent with its selfdiscipline and self-denial begins
 - 2. Disingenuous at best: I'll be a good person until I don't have to

 - 3. We don't know the time, season, or day, 14. Paul urges us to live with the scout motto: be prepared
 - 5. The Day will come like a thief: an image used by Jesus as well
 - 6. Many people will be saying, "peace and safety"
- C. Long history of ignoring sin and its consequences
 - 1. Jeremiah 6:14 the prophets and priests essentially say, "Everything is alright"
 - 2. Jeremiah 8:4-11 addresses the same thing and they don't have any shame about their sins
 - 3. The "peace and safety" mantra is only a step away from "eat, drink, and be merry"
 - 4. An attempt to preserve certain social and sinful conventions: everything is just fine so keep doing what you are doing
 - 5. When all seems OK, Jesus will appear
 - 6. Are we in darkness for that day to surprise us? (verse 4)

Second: Do you like surprises? (5 – 8)

- A. My surprise parties
 - 1. One was in Massachusetts: I figured it out when I saw all the cars
 - 2. For others I haven't been so alert which is weird because I am usually good as catching clues
 - 3. Janet and the whole church here surprised me with a 40th party downstairs on a Sunday night: I was unprepared
- B. What do you want to see when the lights come on or you walk into a room full of people?
 - 1. We are children of light, 5

- 2. We are not of the "night or the darkness," 5
- 3. Keep awake and sober, 6
- 4. Wear your armor, 8 (don't take it off)
- 5. Breastplate of faith and love
- 6. Helmet: the hope of salvation
- 7. The Second Coming will surprise us because we don't know when
- 8. Do you want a happy surprise or a sad surprise?

Third: What gives you feelings of excitement and anticipation? (9 - 11)

A. Destined for salvation, 9

- 1. We may not know specific times and seasons, but we know more than others and we know our destiny:
 - 1 Peter 1:10-11, prophets sought time and circumstances
 - Eph. 3:5, a mystery not make known in earlier times
 - 1 Corinthians 2:7, we have God's wisdom in the cross that was once hidden
- 2. Our goal is not merely character development or fulfillment of human potential
- 3. These are part of the larger goal
- 4. Our goal is living with Christ in eternity
- 5. Does that fill you with excitement and anticipation?
- B. Encourage and build up one another, 11
 - 1. See this as an effort by everyone in the community ("as you are doing")
 - 2. Each individual has a role to play in this, not just the leaders and teachers
 - 3. We should be like the Roman church 15:14
 - 4. It is a person to person activity among all members of the congregation
 - 5. The rest of 1 Thessalonians 5 details the program of exhortation and encouragement

Conclusion:

- 1. We are no better off if we know the exact date of Christ's coming; we'd waste our time in dissipation and sin.
- 2. Even if you don't like surprises, the Day will surprise you, but you can be ready for it.
- 3. Anticipate eternity; be enthralled with the idea.
- 4. Encourage one another and continue to do good works.
- 5. For those who've never prepared for the Day of Christ's coming, your opportunity is now.
- 6. Accept the Gospel that saves you from sin: believe, repent, confess, and be baptized so that you too will be one of the people in this world that has hope.
