Title: OUR DEEPEST YEARNING, ISAIAH 64:1 – 9 (Chatham, NJ; 12/3/17, AM) [Pt – Exegetical]

Theme: Isaiah expresses a deep yearning for God to deliver Israel, and in so doing he expresses humanity's yearning for forgiveness and communion with its creator.

Purpose: To demonstrate how Christ's birth still appeals to our deep sense of wanting communion with God.

Introduction:

- 1. Isaiah expresses yearning and longing for God to forgive and to redeem.
- 2. To understand this yearning all you have to have is a feeling of emptiness, a feeling that something is missing and has kicked your life out of balance.
- 3. The incarnation satisfies Israel's yearning for God to deliver them: Zechariah's and Mary's songs reflect this.
- 4. Their experience was the beginning of an important episode of the redemption story.
- 5. Isaiah 64:1-9 voiced an early yet contemporary expression of that yearning.

Isaiah's Plea for Redemption, 1 – 4

- A. Seeking God's presence
 - 1. Come down and shake the mountains, 1 (as at the Exodus)
 - 2. The effect of fire on wood and water is the effect of God's presence, 2
 - 3. The nations would tremble at his presence
 - 4. An allusion to Israel at Mt. Sinai Israel's collective consciousness remembered this
 - 5. The prophet's yearning for God is also expressed in Romans 8:20-25
- B. Those who wait for him, 4b
 - 1. Romans 8:25 concludes with the same: wait patiently
 - 2. But for Isaiah the wait didn't quite have the same dimension of the incarnation
 - 3. Though we have seen the fulfillment of Israel's yearning, we still must wait in hope
 - 4. 2 Peter 3:4ff. some were still complaining about the wait
 - 5. Gal. 4:4-5, the fullness of time has come upon us
 - 6. Isaiah 40:28-31, the prophet encouraged people to wait on God because of his nature
 - 7. 5a provides an encouraging reminder about God
 - 8. We can wait on God because of what he did by sending his Son
 - 9. We keep our yearning alive whenever we remember Him

Our Distress, 5 – 7

- A. Our sins have created distress
 - 1. God was angry at our sins, 5b
 - 2. We languished in them a long time
 - 3. "Shall we be saved?" his yearning pours forth in doubt mixed with anxiety
 - 4. Images of uncleanness: polluted garment, a leaf blown by the wind
 - 5. Like a leaf we are powerless over our sins
 - 6. No one calls you
 - 7. You have hidden your face
 - 8. We melt in our iniquities
- B. Alienation from God and others
 - 1. Sin has separated us from God
 - 2. Sin has caused disruptions in our relationships with others despite the fact that we were made to be in relationships
 - 3. Think of the negative impact of sinful behaviors: lies, anger, greed, sexual immorality

- 4. Sinful behaviors spread like an infection once they are introduced
- 5. More alienation, distress, and yearning are produced
- 6. Sin and alienation from God truly have created the emptiness in our souls

Isaiah's Confidence and His Request for God's Favor, 8 – 9

- A. You are our father, 8
 - 1. After Christ we have assuredly been adopted as sons, Gal. 4:4-6
 - 2. Christ assures us that the Father will hear our prayers, Luke 11 ask, seek, knock
 - 3. Jesus has affirmed the relationship that he is our Father
- B. With humility we approach and are healed
 - 1. We humble ourselves before him
 - The first step to healing: we admit to needing God's help since we have no power over sin
 We are the clay and God is our potter

 - 4. We allow him to mold us
- C. Don't remember our sins, 9
 - 1. Jeremiah's promise of a new covenant comes to mind in Isaiah's plea
 - 2. Ps. 25:7 remember not the sins of my youth
 - 3. Israel's divine literature didn't lack in understanding of the problem of sin
 - 4. Ps. 80:3, 7 "restore us that we may be saved"

Conclusions:

- 1. By remembering once again the incarnation of Christ, we find our yearnings realized in a humble stable in the humble city of Bethlehem.
- 2. The new covenant is one of complete forgiveness and cleansing.
- 3. Satisfied and forgiven we still yearn and wait for final salvation.
- 4. Remember again his coming and celebrate its healing power.
- 5. We invite you to believe, repent, confess, and be baptized.
