Title: EARLY GOOD NEWS, ISAIAH 61:1 – 11 (Chatham, NJ; 12/17/17, AM) [Pt – Then/Now Outline]

Theme: More good news from Isaiah dilutes the modern doomsday predictions.

Purpose: To demonstrate that Isaiah preached good news and that Jesus fulfilled his predictions by his newer good news.

Introduction:

- 1. More doomsday predictions have bitten the dust: #9, 11, 16, 18 (it wasn't much longer and we were being warned about global warming, and now they can't call it that so it is the innocuous "climate change.")
- 2. We should care about the planet, but we should not fall prey to overstated doomsday predictions.
- 3. Once again we turn to the prophet Isaiah.
- 4. He preached good news, and when Jesus came he fulfilled it.

Good News, 1 – 2

- A. Then: The Spirit of the Lord
 - 1. Good news to the poor
 - 2. The Spirit's message contains all the following:
 - 3. Healing the broken-hearted
 - 4. Liberty to the captives
 - 5. Recovering of sight for the blind
 - 6. The year of the Lord's favor
 - 7. Day of vengeance: justice against adversaries
 - 8. Comfort for those who mourn
 - 9. Renewal of a broken spirit, 3
- B. Now: Jesus' proclamation, Luke 4:21
 - 1. This scripture is fulfilled in your hearing
 - 2. His audience at that time didn't fully grasp it
 - 3. Many today still don't
 - 4. Fast forward to the proclamation on Pentecost: the message is freedom from sin and guilt
 - 5. To bring healing, liberty, and sight is first to break the chains of sin

Weightier Matters, 8

- A. Then: What God Cares About
 - 1. The Lord loves justice
 - 2. He hates robbery and wrong
 - 3. He pays back according to their deeds
 - 4. An everlasting covenant God keeps his promises
- B. Now: What Jesus Cares About
 - 1. Cleansing the temple: prayer and communion with God as opposed to religious mercantilism
 - 2. The weightier matters neglected by scribes and Pharisees, Mt. 23:23-24
 - 3. Jesus' birth reminds us of God's initiative in all these things, 1 John 4:9-10
 - 4. People will know us by how much we love one another, John 13:35

Prophets with a Plan, 10 – 11

- A. Then: garments of salvation
 - 1. The prophets warn and condemn but always with a way out

- 2. As here in Isaiah, there is always redemption and righteousness from God
- 3. Joel 2:12-17 provides Israel with the opportunity to return to God
- 4. Jonah's story hinges in the notion that God relents from sending disaster
- 5. Ezekiel tells Israel that God takes no pleasure in the death of the wicked
- 6. God devises the means of reconciliation, 2 Samuel 14:14
- B. Now: Gospel of reconciliation
 - 1. Peter preaches this, Acts 3:17-26
 - 2. Reconciliation drives everything in the New Testament, Col. 1:19-22

Conclusions:

- 1. Peace between us and God is what the angels proclaimed to the shepherds.
- 2. Are you moved by the joy of the season?
- Get to the source of that joy: God gave his son, John 3:16.
 Renew your faith in Him this year.
- 5. Begin your life of faith this year: believe, repent, be baptized for the remission of your sins and live faithfully to His commands.
