Title: THE GOSPEL IN PETER'S OWN WORDS, 1 PETER 3:18 – 22 (Chatham, NJ: 02/25/18, AM) [E – Exegesis]

Theme: In this letter of Peter's he gives a summary statement espousing the essence of the Gospel.

Purpose: To explain what he says and to inspire others to accept it.

Introduction:

- This is essentially an evangelism passage despite being written to people who are already Christians.
- 2. Peter is not trying to prove it like an apologist might, but he affirms what their faith rests on.
- 3. Note that he encouraged them to give an answer for the reason for their faith, and this may be his attempt to remind them what is essential.

Jesus Died, 18

- A. The righteous for the unrighteous
 - 1. Since God is a God of justice, his justice had to be satisfied, Romans 3:25-26
 - 2. Paul affirms that Christ died for the unrighteous, Romans 5:6-8
 - 3. Christ died for unrighteous sinners to satisfy the justice of God
 - 4. The sacrifices under the old covenant were precursors to this: blood sacrifice atoned for sin
 - 5. He was the righteous (without blemish or sin) sacrifice demanded
 - 6. He is our "atoning sacrifice," 1 John 2:2
- B. To bring us to God
 - 1. Sin has separated us from God; Isaiah 59:2-4, our sinful condition
 - 2. Our sin has made us his enemies, Colossians 1:21
 - 3. Christ's death reconciles us, 22
 - 4. Jesus said that only through him can this take place. John 14:6
 - 5. Our problems ultimately can be traced to being separated from the author of life

Saved, 20 - 21

- A. What Christians mean by salvation
 - 1. Delivered from judgment and punishment: the world stands under God's condemnation
 - 2. Redemption is another word we use: to be bought out of slavery a redemption price was paid
 - 3. We are slaves of sin, John 8:34
- B. By water
 - 1. God's judgment against evil, Genesis 5:6
 - 2. Noah and his family are saved through water, 20
 - 3. In baptism we too are separated from our previous life of sin by water
 - 4. Peter describes baptism as an "appeal for a clean conscience"
 - 5. Not a normal bath in which dirt is removed
 - 6. Hebrews 9:14 (unblemished); 10:4 (not by the blood of bulls and goats), 22 our consciences are cleansed
- C. By the resurrection, 21
 - 1. The real power
 - 2. Without it our faith is meaningless, 1 Corinthians 15:14
 - 3. But it has happened, verse 20, and there were many witnesses, 3-7
 - 4. We identify with it in baptism, Romans 6:3-4: we die with him and are resurrected with him

Because He Is Lord of All

- A. God has exalted him, 22
 - 1. He sits at the right hand of God with all authority, 22, Mt. 28:18
 - 2. Acts 2:37 God has made him both Lord and Christ
 - 3. Every knee will bow before him, Philippians 2:9-11
 - 4. His enthronement is essential
 - 5. Where Peter started: it provides the basis for our witness, 15
- B. Glory was his eternally
 - 1. John 17:5, he has received back the glory he had before creation
 - 2. He is co-equal and co-eternal with the Father
 - 3. Far above all rule, authority, power, and dominion, Eph. 1:21

Conclusion:

- 1. His life, death, and resurrection can are demonstrable.
- 2. Peter's witness can be believed on its own merit.
- 3. His conclusion is to believe, repent, and be baptized, Acts 2:38.
- 4. To submit to these commands is the essence of the Christian faith.
- 5. If we love him we will obey him.
